STANDARDS—ASSESSMENT AND RATING

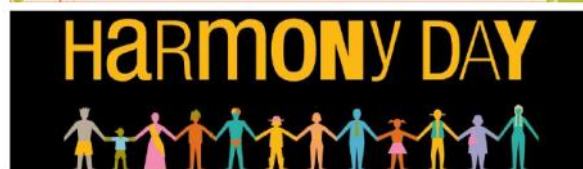

Handy Maths tips for home!

Parents often ask Teachers if they can help their children at home with Maths. The answer is yes! Below are just some of the ways you are able to help your child practise maths skills and concepts in real life situations.

Early Years

- Talk about numbers and count things with your child every day.
- Cooking with your child is great for developing early maths skills. Talk to your child about shapes, sizes and quantities while they watch or help you cook. For example, 'I need one large carrot and one small potato' or 'I am cutting our sandwiches in triangles today.'
- Play 'shops' with things from around the house, using shopping bags, old purses or wallets and real or play money.

Older students

- Discuss how you use fractions in cooking; percentages while shopping; distance in driving; keeping score in sports games and telling the time.
- Work out how many pieces they will need to cut the birthday cake into so that everyone has a slice
- Work out the actual cost of discounted items (e.g. 25% off \$20)
- Figure out when you will arrive at a destination (e.g. "It is 4:15 pm now. It will take us 30 minutes to get home, what time will we arrive?")

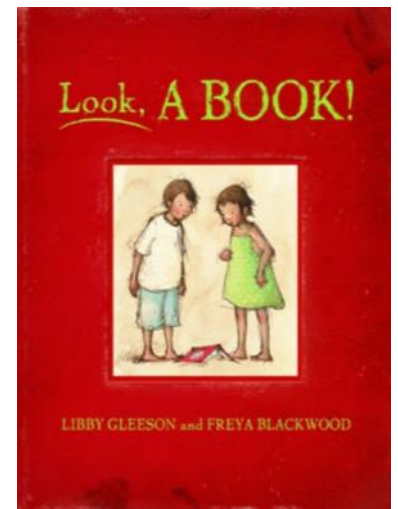
Look, A BOOK!

HEAD LICE

Head Lice are very common in school aged children. Cases of lice often increase following school holidays. They can't be prevented, but with regularly checking you can ensure early detections and provide treatment if necessary.

To help prevent the spread of head lice, we ask that you:

Notify your child's school as soon as you detect head lice or eggs in your child's hair.

Take advice as to the best treatment for your child and family and follow the pharmacist's instruction.

What your school will do:

The school will notify you if there is reason to believe your child has head lice.

You will be asked to collect and treat your child's hair.

Your child is able to attend school once treatment has been provided.

The school will **NOT** administer treatment to your child.

The Alannah & Madeline Foundation's Better Buddies Framework is an initiative designed to create friendly and caring primary school communities where bullying is able to be reduced.

The Alannah & Madeline Foundation is a national charity protecting children from violence and its devastating effects. The Foundation was set up in memory of Alannah & Madeline Mikac, aged 6 and 3, who were tragically killed along with their mother and 32 others at Port Arthur, Tasmania on 28 April 1996.

Through Better Buddies, older and younger students in primary school buddy up and learn the values: *caring for others, friendliness, respect, valuing difference, including others and responsibility.*

Better Buddies enables younger children to feel safe and cared for while older children feel valued and form a sense of responsibility.

At Renmark North PS we integrate the Better Buddies program into our whole school activity days throughout the year. This week, the students will be meeting for a Harmony/Bullying No Way! Day activity on Thursday March 15th.

Some classes have met already to familiarise themselves with their Buddy, and on Thursday they will be creating a Friendship Wristband together.
